

Here are the steps to become a TEAMS Collegiate Host

Imagine introducing your program to some of the highest caliber STEM students in the nation.

About the competition

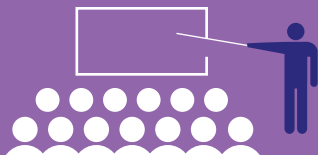
TEAMS: Tests of Engineering Aptitude, Mathematics, and Science provides real-world exposure to the engineering profession. The competition's scenarios challenge participants to collaboratively address questions that bridge classroom study in science and math with practical engineering problems.

The test is in two parts: 90 minutes each at the high-school level and 60 minutes each at the middle-school level. Students are grouped in teams of 4 to 8. You determine any limits on the number of schools and students you host.

Stage your event

Welcome students to your campus!

Perhaps you'll want to make TEAMS Day part of an open house. Or augment the day with lunch, a guest speaker, campus tour, or awards ceremony to recognize participants.



Return completed results

to TSA using the pre-paid, pre-addressed shipping materials provided to you.

Enlist volunteers

to act as proctors and scorers for Part 1 of the test. (You will be provided a template to make scoring quick and easy.)



Receive the competition materials

from the Technology Student Association (TSA), which manages this program and ships the test ready for distribution.



Plan your day

Consider whether you want to make the TEAMS competition a stand-alone event...or part of something bigger.

This day might just have been the "aha" moment for one or more students you hosted, turning them on to new academic achievement and a lifetime of professional satisfaction!

Bonus!

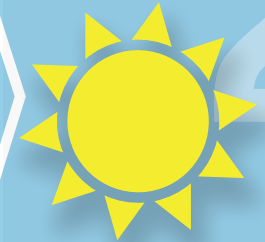

1 Invite

local middle and/or high schools to participate.



2 Pick a day



to host the competition during the competition window in February and March.

3 Find a space

on your campus to accommodate student participants.
